11 We are responding to your advisory opinion request on behalf of  
12 PoliticalMeetings.com, LLC, (“PM.com”) concerning the application of the Federal  
13 Election Campaign Act, 52 U.S.C. §§ 30101-45 (the “Act”), and Commission regulations  
14 to PM.com’s proposal to allow its subscribers to make small, monthly contributions to  
15 candidates and national political party committees via the PM.com’s web-based platform  
16 and to provide subscribers access to non-public information about political meetings and  
17 events with recipient candidates and national party committees.

18 The Commission concludes that PM.com’s proposal is permissible under the Act  
19 and Commission regulations and that the proposal would not constitute contributions  
20 from PM.com — or you as the sole member of PM.com — to candidates or national  
21 political party committees.

22 ***Background***

23 The facts presented in this advisory opinion are based on your letter received on  
24 February 1, 2024, and the politicalmeetings.com website.<sup>1</sup>

1 PM.com was founded in 2023 by you, its sole member. The LLC is registered  
2 with the Colorado Secretary of State as a sole proprietorship and is treated as such for  
3 federal income tax purposes.<sup>2</sup>

4 PM.com is a web platform designed to provide the public with information about  
5 candidates and national party committees and meetings held by them.<sup>3</sup> You state that  
6 PM.com was established to fill a national void of information about political meetings  
7 held by candidates and national party committees.

8 PM.com will gather and publish on its platform public information about  
9 candidates and national party committees, which will be available to all visitors of the  
10 website.<sup>4</sup> To this end, using information from public sources such as the public websites  
11 of candidates, Secretaries of State, and the Commission,<sup>5</sup> PM.com will gather lists of  
12 candidates and will provide a “Basic Profile” of each candidate, such as the office they  
13 seek and their campaign committee’s contact information.<sup>6</sup> Additionally, PM.com’s  
14 “[i]n-house data teams” will locate meetings held by candidates and national party

1 committees on the local, state, and national levels in the top three largest counties of each  
2 state.<sup>7</sup>

3 PM.com will offer its website visitors the ability to subscribe to its services for  
4 additional benefits. Subscribing would allow viewers to make contributions of \$1.00 per  
5 month through PM.com to candidates who opt to participate.<sup>8</sup> Subscribers also would be  
6 able to choose to add a \$0.50 monthly contribution to a participating national party  
7 committee.<sup>9</sup> Additionally, subscribers will have access to “Enhanced Profile[s]” of  
8 candidates and national party committees containing information about non-public  
9 meetings held by participating candidates and national party committees.<sup>10</sup>

10 PM.com will require subscribers to complete a Subscription Registration Form  
11 that will include disclaimers and require contributor information as prescribed by the Act  
12 and Commission Regulations.<sup>11</sup> If, based on the information provided by the potential

4. Subscriber is not a federal contractor;
5. Subscriber is using their own personal funds and not funds given to them by another person for the purpose of making the contribution;

1 subscriber, the individual is ineligible to make contributions, “the platform will not allow  
2 [the contributor] to proceed.”<sup>12</sup> For eligible subscribers, the form will enable them to  
3 choose the party affiliation of the candidates they wish to contribute to, and the option to  
4 add a monthly \$0.50 contribution to a national party committee.<sup>13</sup>

5 PM.com will charge a base subscription rate of \$2.98 per month, which will  
6 include a one-dollar contribution to a candidate and an administrative fee of \$1.98 paid to  
7 PM.com to cover their operational costs.<sup>14</sup> Subscribers may add to their subscription  
8 \$1.00 monthly contributions to as many participating candidates as they wish and a \$.50  
9 monthly contribution for a national party committee.<sup>15</sup> If a subscriber contributes to  
10 more than three candidates, PM.com will charge the subscriber an additional \$1.98  
11 administrative fee.<sup>16</sup>

12 In addition to the ability to contribute to participating candidates and national  
13 party committees, subscribers “[will be able to] search for meetings . . . listed by

1 candidate’s name, state, entity name or ‘key word’ within the same party affiliation”<sup>17</sup>  
2 and will have access to further nonpublic information gathered by PM.com.

3 Candidates and national party committees may participate in PM.com’s platform  
4 without charge. To participate, they must agree to PM.com’s “Permission Slip,” which  
5 will require them to provide PM.com with bank account or pay gateway information and  
6 allow the pay gateway processing company, in this instance Stripe, to directly deposit  
7 contributions into their designated bank accounts.<sup>18</sup> Further, participating candidates and  
8 national party committees will have to agree to provide PM.com with information about  
9 their “meetings or events that are ordinarily not open to the public.”<sup>19</sup>

10 When a candidate opts to participate, their Basic Profile, previously populated by  
11 PM.com using only public information, will be “converted to an ‘Enhanced Profile.’”<sup>20</sup>  
12 The Enhanced Profile will have three features in addition to the Basic Profile provided to  
13 the general public.<sup>21</sup> These features will include: 1) a link to a page that will allow  
14 subscribers to contribute to a candidate or national party committee, 2) a link to a page  
15 containing content in the PM.com’s database, which will include, for example,  
16 information about non-public fundraisers and special events<sup>22</sup>, and 3) a dashboard where  
17 the participating candidates and committees may track donations and run reports.<sup>23</sup>

1 Participating candidates and participant committees “would be required to complete a  
2 form or email PM[.com] with any information it would like published or information on  
3 meetings or fundraisers” and may include a link to their campaign websites.<sup>24</sup>

4 PM.com will use Stripe, a pay gateway company, to process contributions and  
5 administrative fees paid by the subscriber.<sup>25</sup> The current fee for processing contribution  
6 transactions on PM.com is 2.9% plus \$.30 per transaction.<sup>26</sup> The subscriber generally  
7 pays the transaction fees charged by the pay gateway in addition to their total  
8 subscription of more than \$3.48.<sup>27</sup>

9 Stripe will split the funds paid through PM.com and will directly deposit the  
10 contributions to candidates and national party committees using the account information  
11 they provided.<sup>28</sup> PM.com does “not accept [contributions] on behalf of [recipient  
12 committees]. Should an error occur where funds were inadvertently deposited into [a]  
13 [PM.com] bank account,” the error would be corrected within two business days.<sup>29</sup>  
14 Stripe would deposit the remaining funds (total subscription amount minus the  
15 contributions) into the PM.com’s “Subscription Account.”<sup>30</sup> Once PM.com reconciles

1 the Subscription Account with Stripe, it will transfer the administrative fees to its own  
2 “Operating Account.”

3 ***Question Presented***

4 *Is PM.com’s proposal to allow its subscribers to make small, monthly*  
5 *contributions to candidates and national political party committees and to provide them*  
6 *with non-public information about political meetings and events with the recipient*  
7 *candidates and committees permissible under the Act and Commission regulations?*

8 ***Legal Analysis***

9 Yes, PM.com’s proposal would be permissible under the Act and Commission  
10 regulations, and the proposed subscription service would not constitute a contribution  
11 from PM.com or you, as PM.com’s sole member, to candidates or national political party  
12 committees.

13 The Act and Commission regulations provide that a “contribution” includes any  
14 “gift, subscription, loan, advance, or deposit of money or anything of value made by any  
15 person for the purpose of influencing any election for Federal office.”<sup>31</sup> “[A]nything of  
16 value” includes in-kind contributions such as the provision of good or services without  
17 charge or at a charge that is less than the usual and normal charge.<sup>32</sup> Commission  
18 regulations define “usual and normal charge” for goods or services as “the price of those  
19 goods in the market from which they ordinarily would have been purchased at the time of

1 the contribution” or the “commercially reasonable rate prevailing at the time the services  
2 were rendered,” respectively.<sup>33</sup>

3 In several previous advisory opinions, the Commission concluded that companies  
4 that process contributions as a service to contributors without receiving compensation  
5 from the recipient political committees were not making contributions<sup>34</sup> because the  
6 companies were not providing services to the political committees.<sup>35</sup> The Commission  
7 has also approved proposals in which companies that process contributions as a service to  
8 contributors provide contributors with tools to gather information about and to evaluate

1 potential recipient candidates.<sup>36</sup> The Commission has reasoned that providing such  
2 information is a “corollary of creating a web platform through which users [can] identify  
3 political committees and transmit contributions.”<sup>37</sup>

4 PM.com’s proposed service to its subscribers closely resembles the services  
5 approved by the Commission in Advisory Opinion 2015-15 (WeSupportThat.com),  
6 Advisory Opinion 2014-07 (Crowdpac), Advisory Opinion 2012-22 (skimmerhat), and  
7 Advisory Opinion 2011-19 (GivingSphere). Here, as in those advisory opinions,  
8 PM.com proposes to develop a for-profit, web-based platform through which it provides  
9 information to subscribers so that they can identify and make contributions to political  
10 committees. Contributions will be transmitted to candidates and national party  
11 committees at the choice of the subscribers and not pursuant to any agreement between  
12 PM.com and the recipient political committees.<sup>38</sup> Because PM.com will provide these  
13 services to its subscribers — rather than to the recipient political committees —

1 PM.com’s proposal is analogous to widely available services that contributors may use to  
2 send contributions, such as United Parcel Service or electronic bill-pay services provided  
3 by banks.<sup>39</sup> And because the administrative fees that PM.com will collect are ““for the  
4 benefit of the contributors, not of the recipient political committees,”” such fees “d[o] not  
5 ““relieve the recipient political committees of a financial burden they would otherwise  
6 have had to pay for themselves.””<sup>40</sup> Accordingly, as in the prior advisory opinions,  
7 neither PM.com’s services nor its fees are contributions to the recipient political  
8 committees.<sup>41</sup> For the same reasons, PM.com’s proposal to utilize Stripe’s platform to  
9 process and forward subscribers’ contributions to candidates and national party  
10 committees would not result in contributions from PM.com to the recipient committees.

11 PM.com’s proposal to provide subscribers with Enhanced Views of the pages for  
12 the candidates and the national party committees to which they choose to contribute  
13 through the platform is also similar to those approved by the Commission in previous  
14 advisory opinions.<sup>42</sup> The Enhanced Views would be an added service to PM.com’s

1 subscribers and would not constitute a contribution by PM.com to the recipient  
2 committees because it would not relieve the candidates and national party committees  
3 from a financial burden they would otherwise have to pay themselves. Accordingly,  
4 PM.com’s provision of this information to its subscribers is also permissible under the  
5 Act and Commission regulations.

6 In sum, the Commission concludes that PM.com’s proposal is permissible under  
7 the Act and Commission regulations and that the proposal would not constitute  
8 contributions from PM.com — or you as the sole member of PM.com — to candidates or  
9 national political party committees.

10 This response constitutes an advisory opinion concerning the application of the  
11 Act and Commission regulations to the specific transaction or activity set forth in your  
12 request. *See* 52 U.S.C. § 30108. The Commission emphasizes that, if there is a change  
13 in any of the facts or assumptions presented, and such facts or assumptions are material to  
14 a conclusion presented in this advisory opinion, then the requestor may not rely on that  
15 conclusion as support for its proposed activity. Any person involved in any specific  
16 transaction or activity which is indistinguishable in all its material aspects from the  
17 transaction or activity with respect to which this advisory opinion is rendered may rely on  
18 this advisory opinion. *See id.* § 30108(c)(1)(B). Please note that the analysis or  
19 conclusions in this advisory opinion may be affected by subsequent developments in the
