The Federal Election Commission reviewed the allegations in your complaint received on September 26, 2018. On May 21, 2019, the Commission considered the allegations in your complaint, but there was an insufficient number of votes to exercise its prosecutorial discretion to dismiss the allegations as to End Citizens United and Kimberly Coleman in her official capacity as treasurer and Beto for Texas and Gwendolyn Pulido in her official capacity as treasurer. Accordingly, the Commission closed its file in this matter.

Documents related to the case will be placed on the public record within 30 days. See Statement of Policy Regarding Disclosure of Closed Enforcement and Related Files, 68 Fed. Reg. 70,426 (Dec. 18, 2003) and Statement of Policy Regarding Placing First General Counsel's Reports on the Public Record, 74 Fed. Reg. 66132 (Dec. 14, 2009).

The Federal Election Campaign Act of 1971, as amended, allows a complainant to seek judicial review of the Commission's dismissal of this action. See 52 U.S.C. § 30109(a)(8).
