I am filing a complaint through the Federal Election Commission in regards to an ad published in three separate publications paid for MAP, Inc. This ad was first published Oct. 30, 2018 in the Sioux Center Shopper and the total cost of running the ads was over \$1,000. The same ad was also published in the Oct. 31, 2018 Sioux Center News and the Nov. 3, 2018 edition of the N'West Iowa REVIEW.

Per federal election campaign finance rules, MAP, Inc. had 24 hours to report the independent expenditure. As of Monday, Nov. 5, there is no report of this independent expenditure in support of Congressional candidate J.D. Scholten according to our own search as well as a phone representative with the Federal Election Commission who helped me search for it.

In addition the identical ad appeared in the Orange City Ad-Visor. In the Orange City Ad-Visor, it was paid for by SCHOLTEN4Congress. This reveals that SCHOLTEN4Congress coordinated with MAP, Inc during the Iowa Fourth Congressional District campaign.

This is a clear violation of campaign finance law and I would like to request an investigation. (You already have original documentation, but this is an updated letter with proper procedure.)

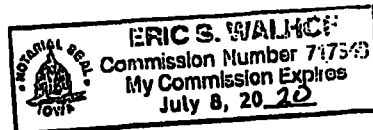

Dear Mr. Jacob:

This is to acknowledge receipt of your letter on November 13, 2018. The Federal Election Campaign Act of 1971, as amended, and Commission Regulations require that the contents of a complaint meet certain specific requirements. Your letter does not meet these requirements. Although your letter was signed in the presence of a notary public and notarized, it was not sworn to, as required.

In order to file a legally sufficient complaint, you must swear before a notary that the contents of your complaint are true to the best of your knowledge and the notary must represent as part of the jurat that such swearing occurred. The preferred form is "**Subscribed and sworn to before me on this ____ day of ____, 201__.**" A statement by the notary that the complaint was sworn to and subscribed before him or her will also be sufficient.

Please note that this matter will remain confidential for a 15 day period to allow you to correct the defects in your complaint. If the complaint is corrected and refiled within the 15 day period, the respondents will be so informed and provided a copy of the corrected complaint. The respondents will then have an additional 15 days to respond to the complaint on the merits. If the complaint is not corrected, the file will be closed and no additional notification will be provided to the respondents.

We regret the inconvenience that these requirements may cause you, but we are not statutorily empowered to proceed with the handling of a compliance action unless all the statutory requirements are fulfilled. See 52 U.S.C. § 30109. If you have any questions concerning this matter, please contact me at (202) 694-1650.



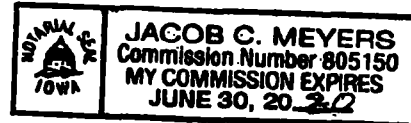
This is a clear violation of campaign finance law and I would like to request an investigation.

Lyon County Board of Supervisors vote to join Sioux Rivers

meant Sioux Rivers had to find another county to join, or be disbanded.

In a 3-2 vote, the Lyon County Board of Supervisors made the decision to leave Care Connections. The transition will take effect July 1, 2019. Lyon County supervisor Mark Behrens, who also is the county representative on Care Connections, and supervisor Randy Bosch voted against leaving.

Lyon County supervisor Kirk Peters cast the deciding vote, simply because he always is the last vote as the representative of District 5.

Peters said Behrens is a good friend and fellow board member and it was difficult to vote against him.

"I respect his viewpoints and I have had a lot of conversations with Mark," Peters said. "When it came down to the wire, it was an emotional thing for Mark. What threw me in the other direction is not because we have been mistreated by Care Connections. I respect the board members. I know them all, but Lyon County sits in a precarious place, out on a peninsula.

"We are bordered by Minnesota and South Dakota. Sioux Rivers was the only other contiguous way to go down the road," he continued.

"By going with Sioux Rivers now, we have given Lyon County options. If we decide two, three, five, 10 years down the road to leave Sioux Rivers, we know we will have Care Connections. If we did not take advantage of this option now, we were going to lose it forever."

Behrens said there was concern in the Lyon County supervisors about the potential for their Care Connections to grow bigger. In August, the Care Connections governing board voted to accept six neighboring counties into the region, essentially doubling its size. The counties were Sioux, Plymouth, Hancock, Kosuth, Winnebago and Worth. How-

ever, after acquiring requested information from the counties in October, the governing board decided not to accept the eastern counties.

Care Connections vice chair and O'Brien County supervisor Tom Farnsworth said the Oct. 23 meeting of the Care Connections governing board was brief.

"A lot of us were in shock," he said. "As far as we knew, they were going to stay. We were told that. Basically, someone got a few more people on the board of supervisors to vote the other way. It all came down to that vote. I'm still trying to figure out why they're leaving. They are getting services. It is puzzling to

us." Farnsworth also said the governing board accepted Plymouth County, but not Sioux County because Sioux did not submit the information by the Oct. 9 deadline, but it was confident the state would have made Sioux join Care Connections come July 1.

"We all thought an eight-county region would have been good and Care Connections was happy to accept them," Farnsworth said. "That is not a bad size."

That was before Lyon County opted to leave Care Connections. Farnsworth was not expecting the situation to become political.

Aftercare Program works to build school, parent bonds

First year venture has 25 children enrolled from SCCS families

A new program is working to enhance the partnership between parents and Sioux Center Christian School.

The private school's Aftercare Program provides a space for transitional kindergarten through fifth grade students to come after school — 3:15-5:30 p.m. each day school is in session; 2:15-5:30 on Wednesdays.

"Through our Aftercare Program, we are seeking to continue our partnership with the parents of our students by working to provide the best child care possible," said program director Jeremy Mills.

The program was established to meet the after-school needs of SCCS parents for their children.

Mills said the need was identified through a questionnaire the school sent out to parents last year.

"Parents indicated a need for a place for their children to go during that interim time between when school lets out and the parents get off work," Mills said. "We created this aftercare program for the interim, to provide a valuable service to parents."

Parents with traditional kindergarten-through fifth-grade students seemed to have

school activities or sports activities," Mills said. "Parents didn't seem to have that need for kids sixth grade and above so we kept eligibility to those lower grades."

Families can sign up for all or certain days of the week. A drop-in option and rate is also available.

In its first year, a total of about 25 children are part of the Aftercare Program.

Most attend on a part-time basis, but parents may sign up students at any point during the school year.

"There's no cap for student participation either," Mills said. "We realize at a certain point our building might get too small, but it fits our needs currently. We'd love to have that growth problem."

Children walk from their classroom to the program's room, which is a separate building, formerly used as a resource classroom on the southwest side of the school.

Students start out inside to check in and receive homework help if needed.

"Our program also provides opportunities for children to get outside or engage in activities in the lunchroom gym when available, as well as board/card games, coloring and Wednesday movie time," Mills said.

Three Dordt College students work as Aftercare Program assistants, taking turns throughout the week to help Mills watch over and care for the children in the program.

The Aftercare Program currently is only open to families with children attending SCCS.

"We wanted to provide support to our school community," Mills said. "This partnership allows us to build a more tight-knit rela-

79 parking spots with 10 of those being handicap designated. The building itself will be 40' by 90' and will house a huge meeting room, a small kitchen and storage area.

"I'm really excited about where the park board is pushing us to go," said Van Meesteren. "Also part of this is going to be an arts room. We worked with the Rec and Arts Council and the art director and we created a space for them that they can run all their programs through. They thought there was no better place than a park."

In addition to the new parking lot and shelter, there will also be some additions to the bike trail directly across the street from Kinsey Elementary School. There will also be a circular bike trail/walking path created within the park.

The existing back parking lot to the east will be taken out. Future plans also include a full-sized basketball court in that same area in proximity to the current playground equipment. Van Meesteren said that the basketball court project would be in the 2019-20 budget.

"We initially wanted to be further along in the process," Van Meesteren said. "The building design was changed a few times and the weather didn't always
